Grading and evaluating student work in class and at the final exam	*Passing two mid-term exams can replace the final written exam. TESTS: Two mid-term exams will be assigned in course of the semester. The final grade can be obtained by passing both tests. Only those students who obtain 50% of points on the first test can take the second. INDIVIDUAL ASSIGNMENTS: The results of individual assignments are regularly assessed and are considered in assigning the final grade. WRITTEN EXAM: Students who do not pass the mid-term exams take the final exam during the official exam sessions. The positive result is achieved by gaining at least 50% of correct answers. Points gained on the project assignments are then added and the final grade is produced. ORAL EXAM: Oral exam is optional and can be taken by the students who wish to improve their final grade. The exact exam dates will be determined by the official Faculty's examination schedule. It is not possible to take the oral exam instead of the written one. EXAMINATION PANEL: When the exam is taken in front of the examination panel it is both written and oral. However, in order to be invited for the oral exam the examinee has to achieve at least 30% of the total points on the written exam.
